Faculty

A faculty roster is required to complete the Request to Establish document and <u>the</u> <u>SACSCOC Faculty Roster Form</u> may be submitted. In situations that require new faculty hires, provide the desired qualifications in the Academic Degrees & Coursework column and the courses the individual to be hired will teach.

Student Demand

Internal methods to determine student demand can include student surveys, enrollment in similar degrees, or developing an academic minor in the discipline to assess student interest.

The university has a license with EAB to provide market feasibility studies that include state, regional, and national data on job posting trends, desired skills, employers, education and

experience levels, and degree completion trends to be used as an external means to determine student demand. Reports can be requested through the Associate Provost for Academic Strategy and Institutional Effectiveness and take approximately six weeks to complete once they are started. The actual time to completion can take longer if other reports have previously been requested.

Information from the UNC <u>Enrollment</u> and <u>Degrees</u> dashboards can be used to complement the EAB feasibility report.
